The homes will be standalone, duplex, terraced and three-level apartments.

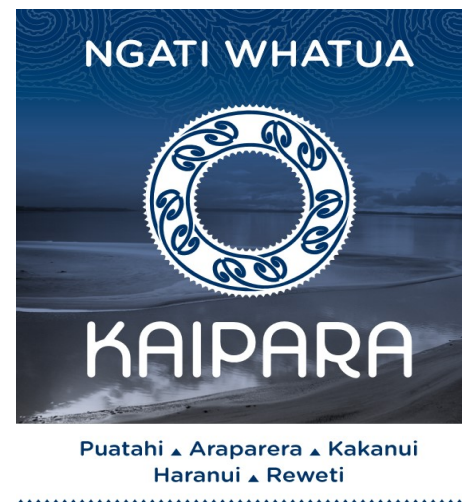
Steve Evans, Fletcher residential and development chief executive, said a partnership had been formed with Whenua Hoko Holdings on the project.

MOSQUITO SPRAYING

Ministry of Prime Industries (MPI) carried out the first round of spraying of mosquitoes that can transmit the Ross River Virus. These larvae have been found in the Kawau Parua Inlet.

There is a second round of spraying planned for 20 November 2018. It is a natural spray so while there is no risk to humans from it, low flying helicopters can scare stock, especially horses.

Dame Rangimarie (Naida) Glavish was invested as a Dame of the New Zealand Order of Merit at a ceremony at Ōrākei Marae on 10 November 2018.

Hapū of Ngāti Whātua from across the motu gave a grand Māori salute in her honour and Whaea Naida told media that she was proud of the united face her iwi Ngāti Whātua put on welcoming manuhiri, and of the many supporters who showed up to witness the event, or sent their apologies.

She said the 1984 incident which first brought her national notoriety, being threatened with dismissal as a post office tolls operator for greeting people with kia ora, was a lesson in standing her ground. "My grandmother taught me if you see something's wrong in front of you, then you must address it, you must correct it, because if you don't, you will become like it. That hasn't made me popular in my journey through life, but I've stood strong by that. If I believe in it and I can live in my own skin, I will stand by it,".

BLUE LIGHT LIFESKILLS & LEADERSHIP PROGRAMMES

In August, Whiti Ora o Kaipara was pleased to sponsor 17 year old whānau member Maria Phillips Ryder (*Haranui*) to attend a Blue Light Programme. Maria is the second member to receive this sponsorship.

New Zealand Blue Light runs a life skills programme centred around a one week live in learning camp. This programme is ideal for those considering career opportunities in the services such as Airforce, Army, Navy and Police so this was a great opportunity for Maria to move a step closer to her goal of joining the New Zealand Navy.

Maria said, “It was interesting, cool and different I was nervous at first because I didn’t know anyone, but after settling myself in I was all goods. I made new friends and we keep in touch through social media. Learning how to march, respond, reply and to be proud of our uniform was also hard but inspiring. Most of us were uncoordinated at the beginning but worked hard at being in sync for our graduation. PT. (*Physical training*) was the hardest so teamwork was very important. I had the best time at Water Rafting it was cool az. My highlight of this course was having my whānau come to my graduation. I felt very proud of my achievements and completing this programme. I would recommend this programme to others, who may want to have a career in the forces or who are just interested about what young people do at this course. Ngā mihi to Matua Loncey who kept me inspired and encouraged me to take the first steps. He has an awesome approach with the youth and the wider whānau. Thank you to Whiti Ora for everything.

KARANGA ATU TAKU MANAWA - WHAEA RIPEKA NAHI

“As a result of my schooling and being punished for speaking Māori at school I made a decision as a ten year old that I was not going to be Māori. I locked all things Māori up

and ignored them for 50 years. I don’t remember making a conscious decision to stop being Māori. In my head Māori was wrong, because it was different, and I didn’t want to feel different, or like I was a bad. That’s how strong the message was from my school years. I would hear waiata Māori and in my head I didn’t want to hear it because that was associated with “being a Māori”. I was quite harsh now that I come to think of it. I would rubbish the song, or I would ignore “Māori” things going on.

I lived overseas for a period. I’ve travelled around and seen things and all this time the girl inside me has been silent . I started coming to the Tūranga Kaumatua. There were little changes, then it was like a light went on. I decided I was going to free that 10-year-old girl that I had kept hidden for all this time. I’m so passionate, it feels like I have been asleep and I have woken up. As an adult now I can see the damage that was caused. I can understand that I did what I did to survive.

I have started learning Waiata. I have written down some lyrics and I want to give those words to the Tūranga kaumatua. The Tūranga Kaumatua has been such a wonderful thing for me. In this rōpu I’m not alone. In this rōpu I am with others that have similiar experiences and I’m now really interested in supporting this roopu because we are family. I love it!!

PĀNUI - TE TARI TAI AO

Atuanui Rahui Update

The Rahui on Atuanui appears to be being respected. Work on Traplines is being maintained and the systematic mapping of Kauri across the Reserve. Four sites are included for monitoring as part of our involvement in the MPI Cultural Health Indicator Study.

Te Ara Manawa Hobsonville Coastal Walkway. The opening will be held Saturday 17 November. Whakamoemiti at 6am and a ribbon cutting ceremony at 930am. Whanau are invited to attend at Launch Road Hobsonville. The walkway and Mahi Toi has been designed by Bernard Makoare.

Henderson/Massey Board have signed up to the Te Kete Rukuruku Project. This will see Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara and Te Kawerau a Maki providing bilingual names and or renaming 179 Parks & Reserves in the Henderson - Massey area.

Future Urban Growth - Roding. Decisions about routes to connect new developments at Redhills, Whenuapai, Kumeū, Dairy Flat and Warkworth are at final shortlist. Some of these roads will not be built for years but the work is about route protection and ensuring opportunities are not lost.

Signage and road safety improvements, Waimauku – Te Awaroa and beyond.

The number of deaths on this section of road is high. A risk audit has been done by NZTA and investigation into signage is underway.

Kaipara Ki Te Tonga – Rohe Moana. The southern part of the Kaipara Harbour has been managed under the Recreational Fishing Regulations unlike the northern part. We have been working to make the change and establish our own Rohe Moana. We are awaiting Ministerial signoff before it will be formally acknowledged. This means our Kaitiaki are appointed for the management of customary food gathering within the area/rohe
